Tell Colette or Howard the days you can be available and we will work out a schedule. We are also in need of 2 locust poles about 8 feet long and 6-10 inches in diameter to support the overhang. In addition, when work on the "Winnie Lou Garden" is finished, we plan to install a period-correct picket fence along the front of the museum as a barrier to the steep hill. We need contributions of materials and labor. All help is greatly appreciated.

Howard Smith has agreed to perform as Museum Manager while Colette is on maternity leave. We all wish Colette well and appreciate "Smitty's" service.

This, That & The Other...our new genealogy and history corner

John Edwards was the first Edwards to come into Yancey County then known as Burke. He was born in 1750 in Baltimore, Maryland. From there he moved to McAllister, PA. From there to Bedford, VA where he resided until the Revolutionary War. His pension records show he volunteered and served several hitches in the army before coming to Jonesboro, TN. His sister Mary had married Christopher Taylor, and they ran a boarding house in Jonesboro. One of their boarders was Andrew Jackson. Due to his stay there, the Taylor house in Jonesboro has been preserved. In 1776 John Edwards married Ruth Crabtree from Bedford County, Va. She had a brother living in Burke County (now Yancey), I suppose that was the reason John and Ruth moved to Yancey, settling in the area now known as Crabtree, which was named for her brother. Two years later John and Ruth applied for a divorce. Deeds show John got all the lands consisting of several hundred acre's Ruth received only a roam mare and a feather bed. Of the eight recorded children they were: William, Sally,

Meredith, James, John Jr., Steven, Anna and Edmond. John, James and Edmond fought in the War of 1812.

restoration. Mr. Ward, a somewhat avid self taught botanist read the article about the proposed Winnie Lou Garden in the last newsletter and contacted one of the board members to say he recalled what plants she had on the grounds at the time she lived there and was interested in helping.

As reported by the president several members have volunteered to help and a great deal of progress has already been made. We have also had some hired labor and earth moving equipment to get the tough spots out.

Mr. Ward has developed a design to return the garden to a 19th century period garden. So we are only using plants that were native to our area and yards in the 1800's. He would

A Salute to Yancey County Veterans

During the month of July the History Museum will feature a very special exhibit honoring the men and women who fought to protect the freedoms we so often take for granted. The exhibit includes donated and on loan items that present a clear picture of the hardship and sacrifice made both at home and abroad. The primary focus of the exhibit is WWI and WWII.

Among of the first donations made to the museum were the WWI uniforms of Stacy Sorrels, infantry, and Grady Bailey, sailor. The museum has since received the WWII uniforms of Charles Hopson, bombardier, and Jeannie Peake, WAC. These uniforms have become the centerpieces of our showcase exhibits.

The History Museum is most fortunate to have on loan the photo and memorabilia displays of Bob Wilson. Mr. Wilson has spent endless hours interviewing veterans and assembling this exhibit. 


